THE BEASTS WALK PAST THEIR HOMES TO KILL GOATS AND BRING UP CUBS IN THE FIELDS, BUT HAVE NOT ATTACKED VILLAGERS

Leopards are present in several parts of Akole taluka. There are regular, though fleeting sightings of the cats. Goats and dogs are regularly picked up and pugmarks are easy to spot.

But beyond the obvious, there is a complete lack of knowledge, information and understanding. Nobody really knows how many leopards are actually present, their behaviour pattern, their territory and their move-

These questions were part of an innovative field biology project to study the leopard in Akole. Supported by Kaati Trust, Pune, the Centre for Wildlife Studies and Centre for Ecological Sciences from Bangalore and the state forest department, the

study has been going on for over two years. The first key results are beginning to emerge. "The initial challenge, has been to get a definite knowhow on leopard numbers in the 300 sq km of research area," says team member Athreya. It began with rigorous surveys of the region on foot and by

road to get a basic assessment of the landscape and an idea of the areas and pathways most likely to be used by the animals. Satellite imageries and Google maps were also used to fine-tune the exercise.

This was then followed by extensive collection of scats for DNA studies. The analysis at a laboratory in Bangalore will give an idea of the numbers of leopards and importantly of the composition of its prey

Another important part of the study has been an intensive camera trapping exercise where self-triggered cameras were deployed to get the pictures of the desired animals. Twenty pairs of cameras were installed for a period of about 15 days in an area of about 70 sq km followed by their relocation to an adjoining block for another fortnight.

The cameras were installed in carefully identified spots just before Diwali and it was around Christmas that the exercise was finally completed. A lot depended on this exercise and the research team could not have asked for a better new year's gift.

The cameras had clicked pictures of 14 different leopards - five adult males, five adult females and $% \left(x\right) =x^{2}$ four cubs. While a statistical analysis is now being undertaken to get a realistic estimate, it is clear from the sheer number of animals photographed that the leopard population here is indeed large.

Taken beyond the confines of the immediate context, the Akole scenario throws up critical challenges to our notion of large carnivore biology and behaviour and the very controversial and

emotional subject of man-wildlife conflict. The leopards of Akole have lived in close proximity to the humans for at least a decade. They regularly walk past their houses, pick up goats from sheds adjoining the homes and give birth and bring up their families in fields only a few meters away.

Yet, there have been no attacks on humans and no strident calls for killing or removal of the big cats either.

The information and the insights being thrown up now, could not only force us to change our understanding of leopard behaviour. In understanding what is actually happening, it may equip us better to deal with problem situations that may arise in the future. A large part of what we believe is our understanding of the leopard, the causes of conflict or the solutions that we have tried to apply, have in fact been based on perceptions and opinions. Wrong decisions often therefore get taken for right reasons and the value of and need for good science becomes all the more relevant in

AKOLE'S IS A NATIONAL STORY

While the Akole situation seems rather unprecedented and unbelievable, the reality across large parts of the Indian subcontinent actually confirms that Akole may not be an isolated case. For long we've believed in India that wildlife (even of the big and dangerous kind) lives only in forests and that is where they should be restricted. Elephants, leopards, wolves, hyena, rep tiles and avi-fauna are found outside areas designated as wildlife sanctuaries and national parks for their protection. Wildlife research, protection, conservation and management thinking in India, however, has continued to be limited

Reports of human-leopard conflict, for instance, are regularly received from places like Gujarat, Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand and West Bengal. A significant percentage of India's wild elephant population too exists outside the protected area network and the same would apply in large or small measure for a number of such threatened species of flora and fauna.

There is clearly a need for a more comprehensive and holistic perspective if conservation is to succeed.

I-T dept may act against defaulters

Many firms in division not depositing TDS with the department

Income Tax Commissioner (TDS Pune region) Pradeep Sharma said on Monday many establishments in the region are found not depositing the Tax Deduction at Source (TDS) to the government even after deducting the amount from the payments.

He issued a warning saying the department has started a drive to collect TDS and those who don't deposit the tax deducted would face penal action.

Sharma was addressing a press conference. Additional commissioner L Ramji Rao was also present.

In Pune region Rs5,227 crore were collected by way of TDS during 2007 -08. But in the current financial year, only Rs5,031 crore have been gathered on this account till February 12 and the target for the year is Rs 6,300 crore, said Sharma.

He said the growth in collection of TDS in the current financial year is only 11% as compared to 30% the preceding year. As the growth is not as good as it was, the department carried out surveys of the establishments.

"It has come to the notice of the department that some assesses are deducting TDS but not depositing it with the government. They are using government money for their own purpose. Hence, the department has swung into action," he said.

BAJAJ ALLIANZ IS TOPPER

Bajaj Allianz Life Insurance is the topper in terms of payment of TDS to I-T deparment's Pune division. It is followed by Tata Motors, Patni Computers, Baiai Allianz General Insurance and Idea Cellular.

In the division consisting of 22 districts, manufacturing sector (33% in 2007 -08) contributes the maximum TDS and it is followed by the software (19%), automobile (14%) and insurance (13%) sectors. In the payments made till January this year, there is a 2% increase in the contribution made by the automobile

Lahuji Vastad samadhi razed

Tension gripped the Sangamwadi and Wakdewadi areas on Monday after a city-based land developer demolished the samadhi of the first revolutionary -Lahuji Vastad Salve-at the Sangamwadi village.

He had fought against the British colonial rule.

A mob of 1,000 people gathered at the spot as the news of the demolition spread across the city. Officers from the Yerawada police station and the riot control van rushed to the spot in the afternoon.

An excavator razed the samadhi under a tree during the levelling work on the 10 acre land along the Mula river.

Local residents and Dalit

organisations demanded prompt action against the land developer. However, timely intervention by a police team headed by senior police inspector Prasad Hasabnis averted any untoward incident.

City MLA and Matang Ekta Adolan state president Ramesh Bagwe said the revolutionary used to conduct his meetings under the tree and the British forces had killed him at that spot. City corporator Avinash Bag-

we said there is no written proof that he was killed at the spot but there are stories about it. "It is a matter of faith of thousands of people and the spot must

be protected," he said.

State social justice minister Chandrakant Handore had visited the spot last month and had promised to construct a memorial but the developer has already razed the samadhi, he said and added, "We will take the issue to the authorities.'
